




What is the UK Pellet Council?

- Board is made up of 11 members representing 3 pellet producers and 8 traders
- To encourage and promote the development and use of wood pellet heating within the UK
- To monitor the policies of government and to represent the interests of the wood pellet sector
 - The National Licenser for the ENplus® certification scheme

What is the ENplus® certification scheme?

- Wood pellet quality certification scheme
- Requirements are largely based on the ISO 17225 standard
- All stages of the supply chain from raw material selection to delivery
- The scheme is run by the European Pellet Council, which is part of Bioenergy Europe



What is the ENplus® certification scheme?

- The National Licenser interfaces with the Certification Body (in the UK's case, HETAS) and Testing Bodies
- The CB is independent of the NL and is responsible for the audit regime and the ongoing certification of member companies
- Member companies pay a fee to the UKPC per tonne of pellets produced and/or traded

- The current ENplus® Handbook was published in August 2015
- Decision was made to revise and update the scheme at the start of 2018
- Advisory committee selected and first physical meeting in Brussels 13th February 2019 (15 members, 3 National Licensers represented)

ENplus® Scheme Revision – Key Changes

- Removal of any link to sustainability it will purely be a quality certification scheme
- Mass balance account to ensure that a company is not selling more ENplus® pellets than it produces
- No restriction on truck technology but if the delivery vehicle is not a pressurised silo e.g. tipper with rotary feed, then the company must provide evidence that excessive fines will not be generated




ENplus® Scheme Revision – Key Changes continued

- CB shall collect and test an additional unannounced sample each year for producers and traders/service providers with bagging activities
- Additional technical parameters particle density and coarse fines (<5.6mm) to be stated
- Opening up of market to CBs
- Closing the scheme to further National Licensers but
 opportunity to apply to be a National Promoting Association

So they are not resting on their laurels - continued emphasis on developing and improving the scheme.







- Documentation available 3 weeks from GA approval
- Date of entry into force (i.e. can be used voluntarily or must be used by new scheme entrants) min. 3 months
- Transition date min. 12 months





The improvement and tightening of the scheme's quality parameters is important because the ENplus® scheme is likely to be the key wood pellet scheme that is linked, via BSL, to the non-domestic RHI.

Non-Domestic RHI reforms 2021

The NDRHI will close, as planned, to new participants at midnight on **31 March 2021**.
